

Topeka concert season appears outstanding

The events sponsored by the Topeka Community Concert Association have been well supported by Manhattan residents in the past and judging by the Association's program for this season a full and interesting season is in store for Association members again this year.

The season opens this Friday evening with a concert given by the Norman Luboff Choir and this is followed on Friday, October 29, by what surely promises to be the outstanding event of the season, a concert by the Cleveland Symphony Orchestra. The Cleveland has long been regarded as being amongst the handful of finest orchestras in the world, reaching its zenith perhaps under the baton of

George Szell. The Cleveland Orchestra's present principal conductor is Lorin Maazel.

Duo pianists Stecher and Horowitz present the third concert in the series on Sunday, November 14, and then it is into the New Year with a concert by the New York Renaissance Band on Thursday, February 15. The season ends with a recital to be given by the outstanding young cellist, Nathaniel Rosen, who was the winner of the Gold Medal at the 1978 Tchaikovsky competition. Mr. Rosen's recital will be given on Sunday, April 10.

All concerts take place in Municipal Auditorium, Topeka. This season's concerts are sold out.
